Some of these changes may be technical and apply to the rules of competition (ensuring fairness for everyone) while others may be for updating language making it more inclusive, relevant, and modern. • Values: Fitness, Camaraderie, Inclusion, Learning, Excellence, Competition, Fairness.

You may ask what language needs to be modernized for U.S. Masters Swimming? In the eyes of our national volunteer leaders, it is the principles or basis of U.S. Masters Swimming.

The proposal before the House of Delegates is to change Organizing Principles or Guiding Principles with three core pillars: Mission Statement, Vision Statement and Values.

- **Mission Statement**: Empower adults to improve their lives through swimming.
- Vision Statement: Foster a nationwide adult swimming community through lifelong fitness, competition, and education.

(Update September 10, 2023 – USMS HOD adopts this proposal.)

O*H*I*O Masters swimmer Susan Polakoff Shaw has had a very unique swimming journey. Starting when she was a young girl growing up in Indiana, she was taught to swim by Jean Ann Dellecamp, who was a seven-time national champion breaststroker with five world records, two time All American, and an alternate for the 1960 Rome Olympics— four years from graduation from high school! This swim experience left an indelible mark on Susan and her love for swimming and sports.

Fast forward a few years ... Susan majored in journalism and graduated from Indiana University. Afterward, she started working for small newspapers and eventually took a job with the Indiana Sports Corporation helping host sporting events in Indiana, including the Pan American Games and the 1984 U.S. Olympic Swimming Trials.



Most national governing sports organizations were headquartered in Indianapolis and the exposure led her to seek a position working in press operations for the U.S. Olympic team in 1988. Susan switched her focus to working for the International Olympic Committee in 2006 at the Turin, Italy, Winter Olympic Games. She now admits to being an "Olympic junkie," as she worked in press operations at *every* Olympics since—and Paris 2024 is next on her radar! When I asked her and Olympic and international swimming officials. The incredible tension and buzz in the room was something I will never forget!"



Some fun facts about Susan: Favorite all time swimmer: Shirley Babashoff. Favorite stroke: a breaststroker most of her life, now she loves freestyle. Favorite places in the world she has swum: Allas Sea Pool, Helsinki, Finland; Laugardalur 50-meter pool, Reykjavik, Iceland; and a very cool hotel pool in Sochi, Russia. Favorite food: Anything fresh from the garden.

Susan met her husband, Bud Shaw, in 1991 working for the Olympics of course! He is a freelance writer who is a retired Cleveland Plain Dealer sports' beat writer. That relationship brought Susan to Cleveland.

After long break, it took the pandemic to bring Susan back to swimming at the O*H*I*O Masters swim practices. She is really enjoying the workouts and her pool time. Make sure when you see Susan you say hello. She has so many more fun stories from her amazing Olympic adventures to share.

Treasurer's Tiny Corner

The fiscal year is continuing and has picked up a little in its pace. The following significant items were completed since my report in the June newsletter:

- The LMSC paid for the pool time and classroom time for the Fundraiser/Clinic held at the end of summer, providing a check for \$430.
- The sanction for Brogan was paid at \$100
- The convention items from early September are still being processed but should be a cost of less than \$1650 to send three individuals to convention. The budget was for \$3000. Our attendees found very reasonable airfares and some costs were covered by USMS, because our Chair is a standing committee chairman, therefore, paid for by National to attend the convention.

As of 9/12/23 we have received income so far this calendar year, including the Top 10 Program and donations at registration in the amount of \$8658.82.

Our expenditures so far this year including the Top 10 Program are \$5367.58.

Outstanding liabilities not booked yet include some of the reimbursements for the annual convention. We have continued to work on finding an appropriate way to donate in memory of Kevin Kelley a sum of \$500. That path has been become much clearer but I have been exploring combining our donation with that of O*H*I*O Masters, however, that looks like it may not work. The previously reported agreement to provide up to \$400 to the Avon swim complex in support of a new pace clock was determined to be unnecessary by the Avon complex people and is no longer a potential expense.

For the rest of our fiscal year the bigger ticket items are the LMSC Annual Meeting (usually in the area of a \$500 expense, which is the budgeted amount). And lastly, the costs for attendance at Relay (a National training development gathering for volunteers) are still to be booked. The board has approved for a third person to attend Relay, which is focused this year on event development. Relay is budgeted for \$1600 but that was for two people so it will likely cost more. I would estimate somewhere in the vicinity \$2200 total since National is not paying for anyone for this event unlike convention but it is in the same location in Houston, Texas.

Hope to see you at the annual meeting, the afternoon after the Stow Pentathlon.
