CAQT has Great Success at GAY GAMES XI

Six swimmers from the Cleveland Aquatic Team (CAQT) traveled to Guadalajara, Mexico in early November to participate in Gay Games 11. CAQT swam in 26 events and brought home 12 individual medals and one silver team medal. The meet was held at beautiful pool built for the 2011 Pan American games.



Clara Innes Forename, a cousin of Julio Aponte, joined the team from Columbia. She won first place medals in the 50 back, 100, back, 200 back and a bronze medal for her 100 breaststroke. Julio Aponte swam in 5 individual events and 2 relays. He won silver medals in the 50 back, 100 back, 100 breaststroke and a gold medal for his 200 backstroke. Nathan Leu swam in five events, winning a bronze in the 100 backstroke. Rick Borja swam in his first meet ever and his relay team came in 4th in the 4 x50 freestyle. His husband, Tom Stebel, swam in five events, winning a bronze in the 200 backstroke and was part of the relay team, with Nathan Leu, Julio Aponte, and Dave Douglass that won a silver in the 4 x 100 free relay. Dave Douglass swam in five events and a relay, winning silver medals in the 1500 free and 200 free, with a bronze in the 800 freestyle.



Gay Games 11 was originally slated to be held in Hong Kong, but changes in the communist government, which occurred after the city was selected, necessitated a second venue in Guadalajara. Hong Kong officials withdrew the use of public athletic facilities in an anti LGBTQ stance, creating a hostile environment for the Games there.

The success of the small CAQT team was exhilarating, while the geopolitical climate reminded us that achieving true equality for the LGBTQ community has many roadblocks yet to clear.



The people of Guadalajara, were warm and welcoming and hosted a very memorable Gay Games experience rich with Mexican culture. The next Gay Games will held in 2026 in Valencia, Spain.



This time of year, Northeast Ohio is cloudy and gray. There is a constant chill in the air. It is time to think of something tropical.

Steve Wargo is up for aquatic challenges. He has swum across Lake Erie, 24.3 miles, the Strait of Gibraltar, 10 miles, the Sea of Galilee 13 miles, the Swim around Key West, 12 miles, his own annual swim along the Cleveland coastline of Lake Erie to raise money for the City Mission, 13 miles. He has attempted the Catalina Channel swim and the Swim around Manhattan.

This past September, at Islamorada in the warm Florida Keys, with the water in the Strait of Florida at 86f and the air 90f, Steve participated in the challenging 8.6-mile Swim for Alligator Lighthouse. As the third oldest person in the race, 66 years old, he finished 25th out of 54 men, 40th out of 84 total finishers, 41 swimmers did not finish. The feeling of accomplishment and camaraderie can come at a price. There is nothing to distract one from fatigue other than the intense discomfort of repeated jellyfish stings. He claimed to have been past the pain after receiving twenty stings on his upper torso at the same time. "The pain turned into intense heat," Wargo stated. "The jellyfish were of the Moon variety so not quite as bad as a bee sting." At one point he cried out in pain and saw emergency boats picking up numerous swimmers. Thankfully as the miles passed and the sun rose higher in the sky, the jellyfish moved about a foot lower in the water and he was not stung as often. On the bright side he reported no toxic algae, sharks or sea lice.

If you yearn for a tropical race, Steve can recommend one. Focus on the beautiful water, the warmth, the sky, the palm trees and mangroves and if necessary, disregard the sea life.

Then we made plans to swim the USMS 3000yard Virtual Championship in September with Lisa Turner (of Mansfield) who swims at all the meets and also swims open water events. She and her daughter drove to Mackinac Island, swam the Brogan Open Water Classic, and she has distinguished herself as a top USMS performer.

Easy, breezy. And it was an added bonus to glimpse the top-notch divers practicing on the high boards whenever we took a breath at just the right time and at just the right angle as we did our laps.



Then Lisa (Flip) Turner, her daughter Tammi, Dan and I made plans to swim the USMS 6000-yard Virtual Championship at CSU with Paddy again timing us along with three additional team mates.

Tammi swam the 3,000. Lisa, Dan and I swam the 6000. Lisa and Dan finished in about I hour 50 minutes and it took me two hours and 13 minutes.

It was very exciting.
